## A LETTER FOR PROFESSOR DEBORAH H. BELL

It is with great pleasure that I offer my sincere congratulations to you, Professor Bell, upon your induction into the University of Mississippi School of Law Hall of Fame. This tremendous honor is well deserved. Your service to the School of Law, your profession, and to our university is remarkable.

I remember our first professional encounter early in my tenure in the Office of the Provost. I was asked to join a meeting with you, Tucker Carrington, and John Grisham. Our goal was to make progress toward more permanent funding, and in permanent employment opportunities, for faculty in the Innocence Project and within Clinical Programs at the Law School. Mr. Grisham explained that he was committed to continue funding, but felt that the university should also pledge resources and to create tenure track positions. After you directed us through a careful discussion, and an explanation of the benefits accruing to the School of Law and its students, I agreed with him. We were able to make progress toward those initiatives thanks to your invaluable leadership in that process.

Our second interaction centered around my efforts to appoint an Interim Dean for the School of Law. As Provost, I felt that stability was needed in the Office of the Dean. I wanted to appoint an Interim Dean who would be primarily, if not solely, interested in the welfare of the Law School, its faculty, staff and students. You reluctantly accepted that role, and I am thankful that you did. Your approach to leadership was perfect for your new responsibilities. You provided needed stability, strengthened relationships with alumni and other supporters, and, most importantly, began the process of carefully understanding the financial issues that were
